Then, in an organized five paragraph essay using MLA format write a letter from Screwtape to Wormwood discussing a specific scene in *The Lord of the Flies*. What method of temptation did they use? Were they successful in guiding their patients toward "Our Father Below"? Be sure to use specific examples from both works of literature.
